

• In Scripture, we meet a man who had the character to be a world-changing man in the world around him:

[Nehemiah was called by God to leave a great job (Nehemiah 1:11) and rebuild the city walls of his hometown, Jerusalem (Nehemiah 2:3-8a; 2:9-3:32). Nehemiah knew God was with him (2:8b). He also found out that it wouldn't be easy, and he would face strong opposition (4:1-32). With that in mind, through Nehemiah's life we see four vital traits a man must have as he changes the world around him...]

 Nehemiah admits his own complicity in oppression. He teaches us to be equal opportunity offenders in our correction, even if the offender is ourselves:

Nehemiah 5:10:

"Moreover, I and my brothers and my servants are lending them money and grain. Let us abandon this exacting of interest..."

 Jesus reinforces this practice of self-assessment before we look at the sins of others:

Matthew 7:3-5:

"Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? Or how can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when there is the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your brother's eye."

 Consent is when a father allows his child to do what they want. A blessing is when you have the endorsement of your father to live as you should.

Biblically, the blessing is like saying, 'I love you. I affirm you. I am putting my name on you.' The blessing gives the child access to everything his/her father has. The blessing gives the child everything they need to live a God honoring life..." - CHRIS HARPER

- **D.** As fathers, we bless our children by...
 - Sharing words of acceptance and love. Simply being present does not communicate a blessing. A blessing is received when it is spoken verbally.

For a child in search of the blessing, silence communicates confusion. Children who are left to fill in the blanks when it comes to what their parents think about them will often feel insecure. Spoken or written words at least give the child an indication that they are worthy of some attention."


